Salvia

Hardy salvias bring perennial colour, fragrance and pollinators to your garden in high summer. We're using the power of observation to find the best of what's available.

Why trial *Salvia*?

A surge in interest in these plants has sparked many new cultivar introductions. We want to assess these for the AGM.

The judges are looking for:

- 🏆 Foliage and flower quality
- 🏆 Habit and overall impact
- 🏆 Vigour and persistence
- 🏆 Pest and disease resistance

Salvias grow best in full sun, but good drainage is the key to getting them to last year after year.



Pollinators such as bees and butterflies love their nectar, yet *Salvia*'s strongly scented leaves ward off deer and rabbits.

Plant trial of
Oregano & Marjoram

These closely related herbs share similar leaves and clusters of lipped flowers, but oregano's stronger, spicier flavour and winter hardiness sets it apart. Both are great for pollinators.

Why 'Trial Oregano and Marjoram'?
New culinary and ornamental cultivars are now available, so we want to compare them with older ones and award AGMs.

INSPIRED TO GROW

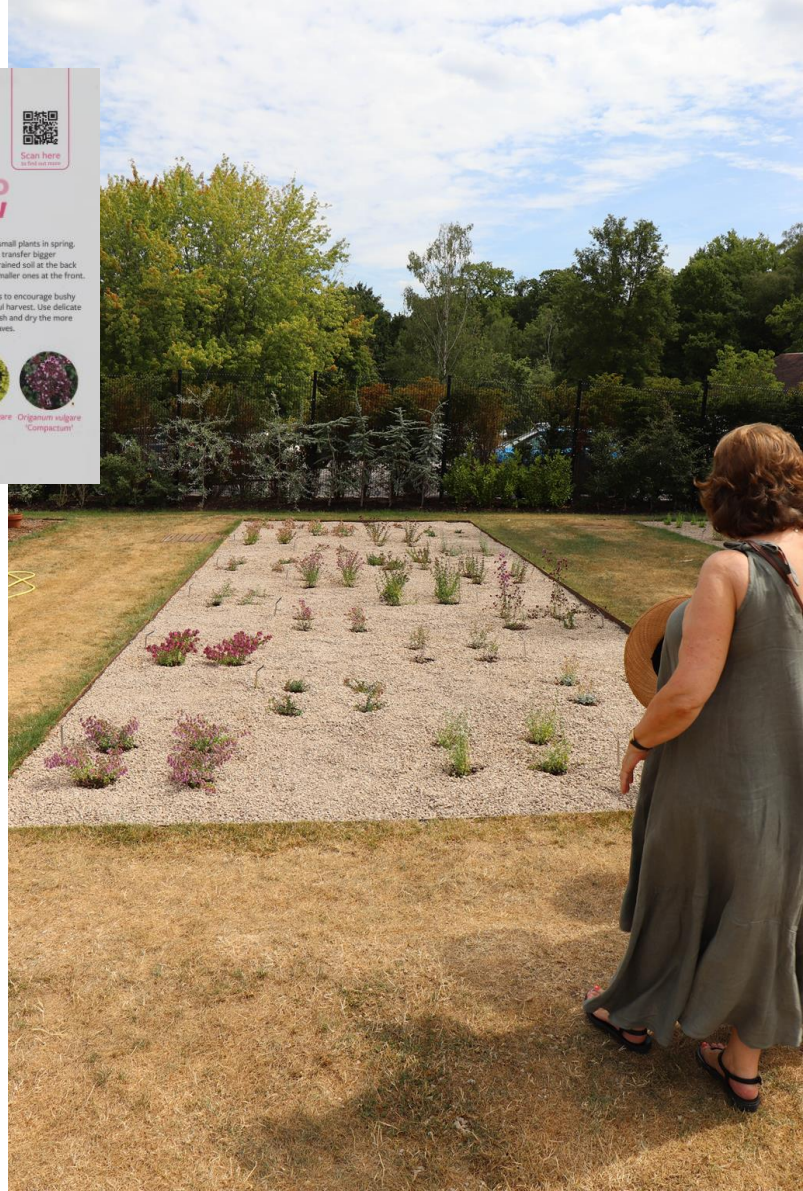
Grow from seed or small plants in spring. After the last frosts, transfer bigger varieties into well-drained soil at the back of a sunny border, smaller ones at the front.

Pinch out new leaves to encourage bushy growth for a plentiful harvest. Use delicate marjoram leaves fresh and dry the more pungent oregano leaves.

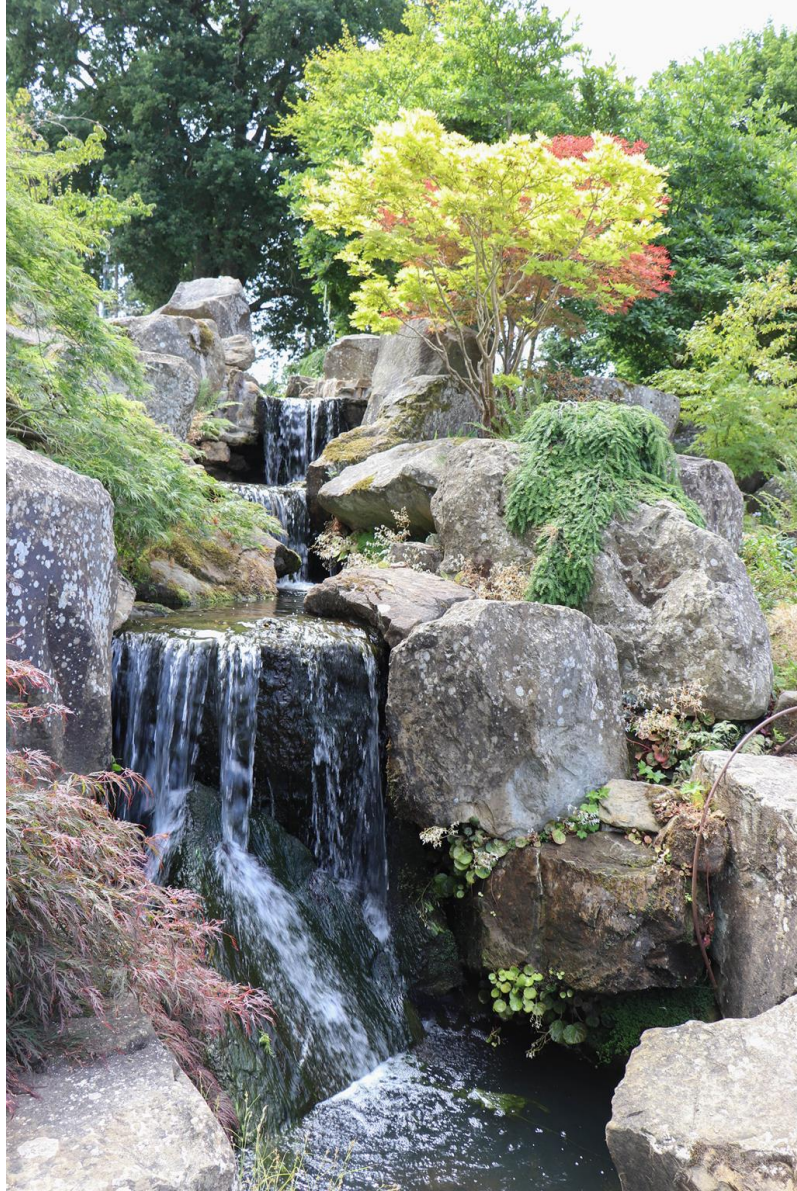












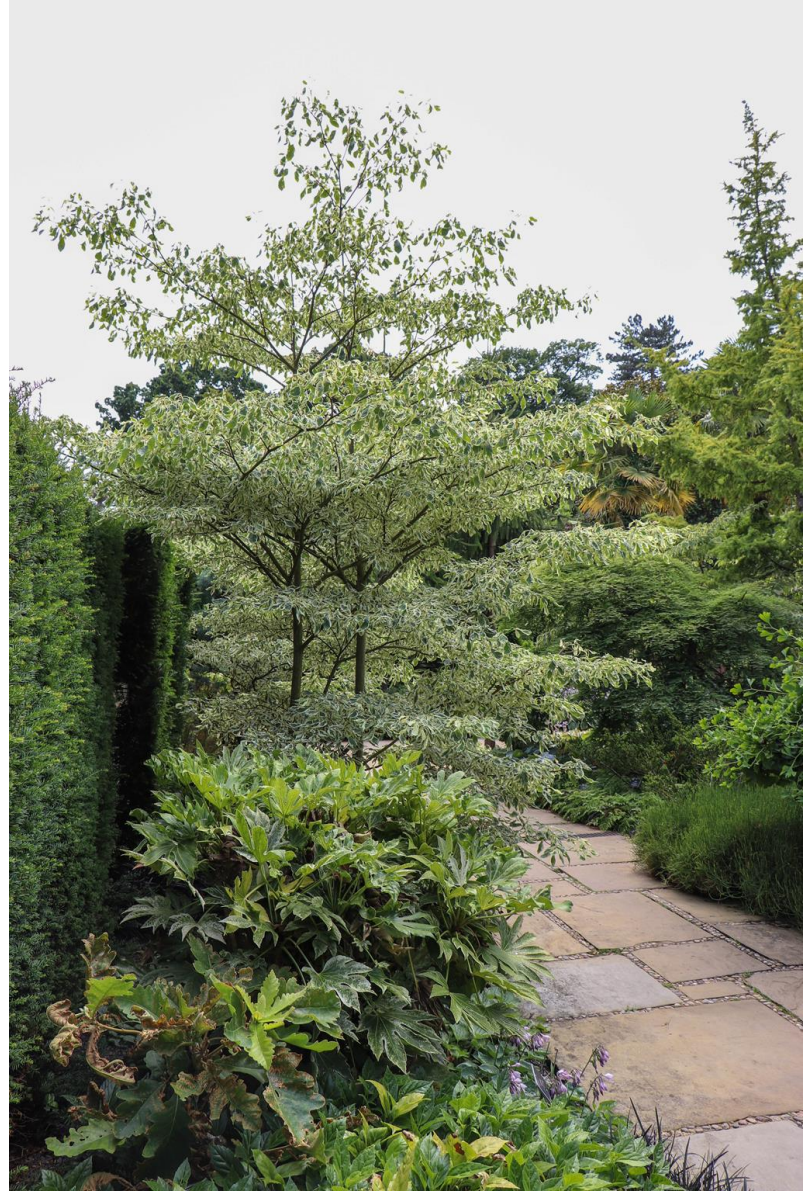
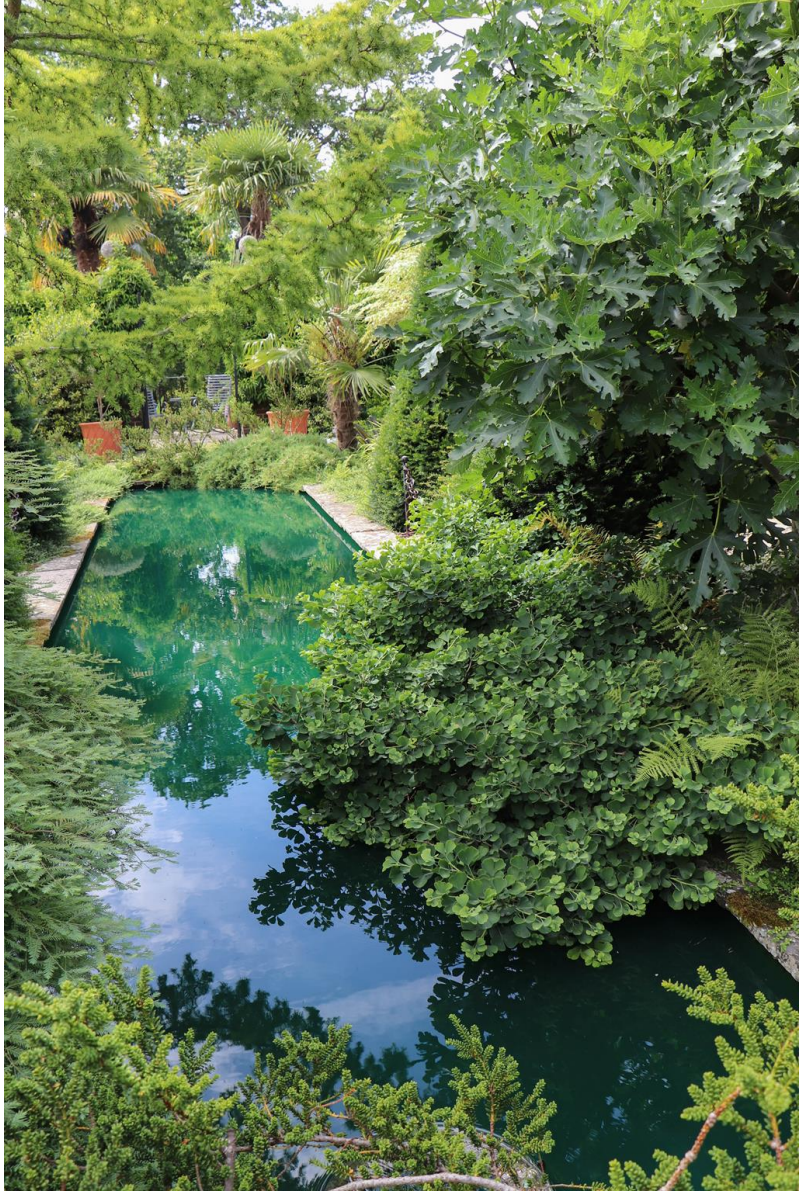

Look among the changing ribbons of colour and texture for bumblebees, solitary bees, butterflies and hoverflies foraging here. Honeybees from our nearby apiary will be frequent visitors too. They are all great pollinators for the collection.

- Different species for all seasons
- Evergreen, pine needle-like foliage
- Small, bell-shaped flowers



Calluna

- Summer-flowering
- Evergreen, conifer-like foliage
- Long spikes of small flowers



Daboecia

- Summer-flowering
- Small, ovate, evergreen foliage
- Large, sparse, bell-shaped flowers

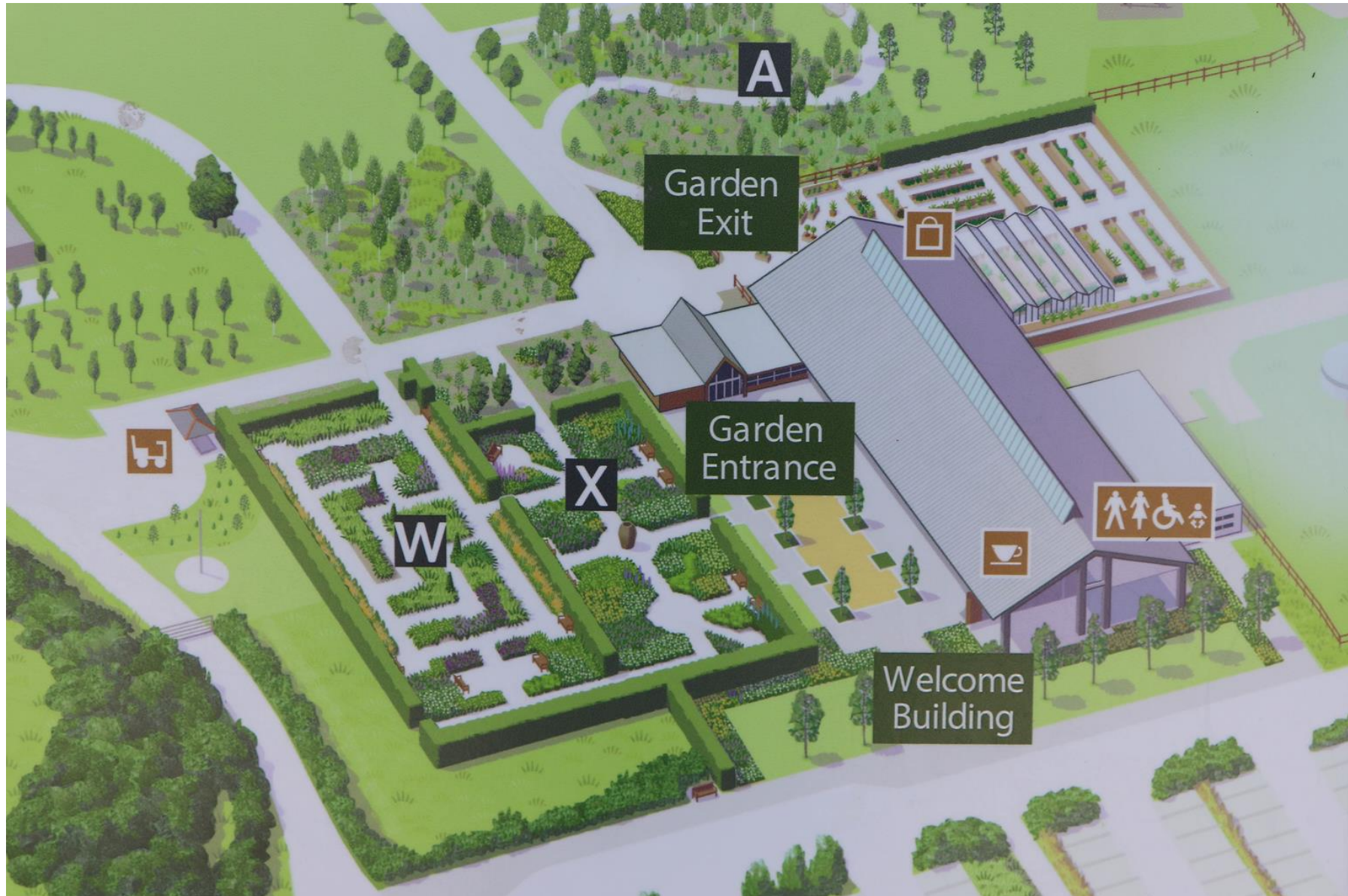

Shrub Roses

The planting in the **Shrub Rose Border** comprises both old-fashioned and modern shrub and species roses, some of which are not grown commonly now. Many have a good fragrance and extra seasonal interest in autumn with large hips.

Look for



Rosa sericea subsp.
omeiensis f. *pteracantha*

A large **species rose** grown for its new thorns that are bright red.



Rosa 'William Lobb'

William Lobb is a **moss rose**. They are named for the growth on their buds and stems which looks like moss.



Rosa gallica 'Versicolor'

Gallica roses are one of the oldest roses in cultivation and were grown by the Ancient Greeks and Romans.



Rosa 'Roseaie de l'Hay'

This is a cultivar of a **rugosa rose**. The Latin word 'rugosa' means 'wrinkled', referring to the wrinkled leaves.

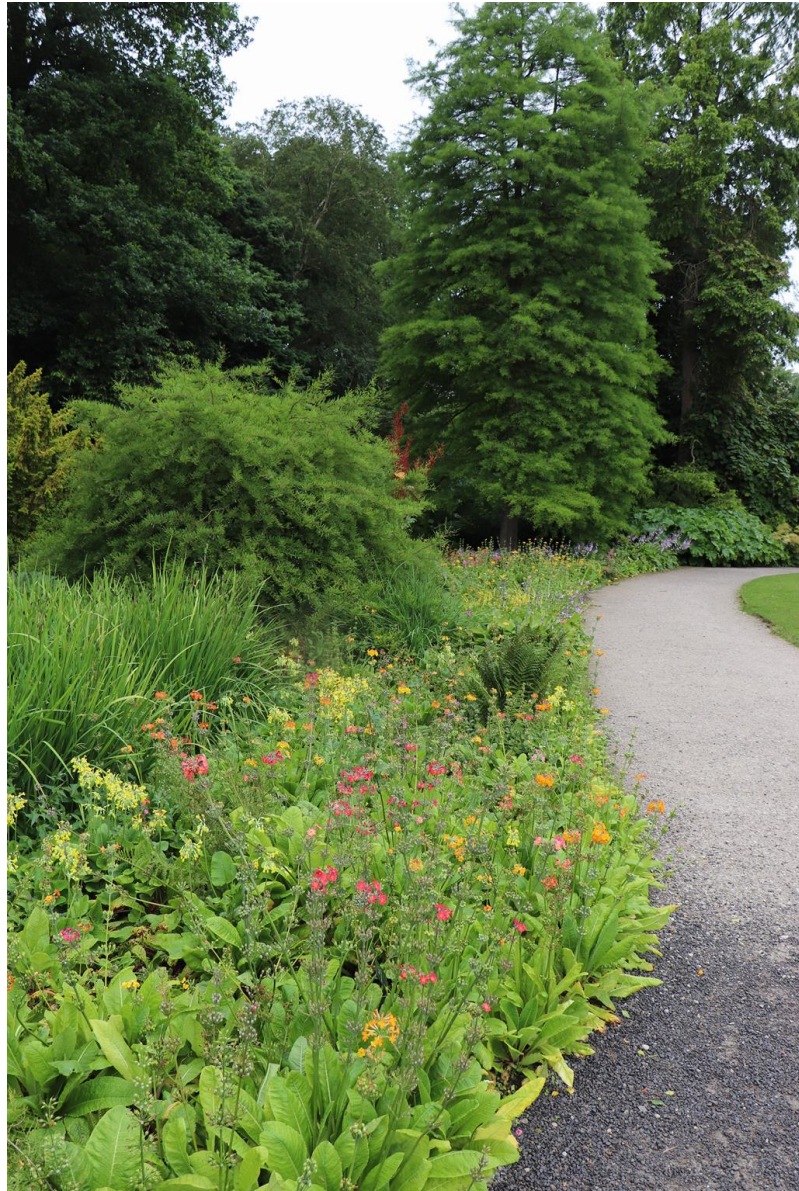








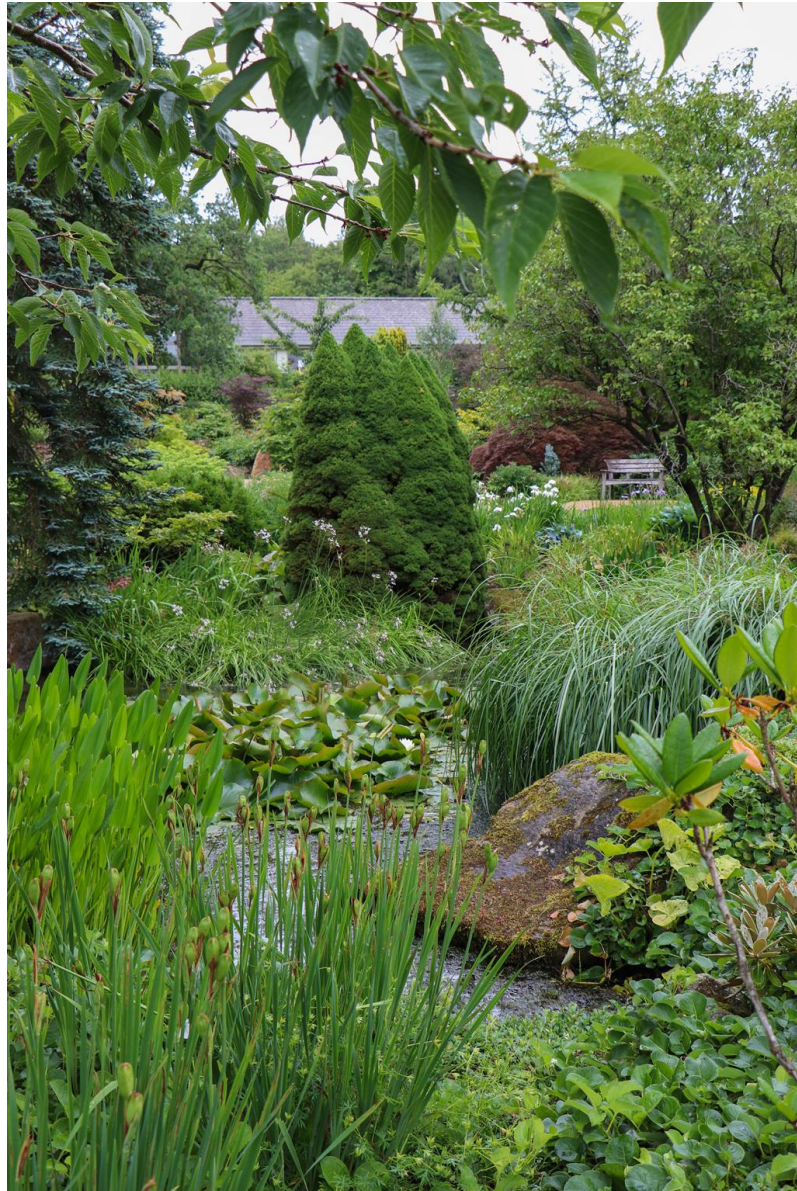
